

Deciduous Shrubs

Abelia mosanensis – Fragrant Abelia – Z5

A medium sized, deciduous shrub developing soft pink buds that open to showcase white flowers in early June. Each flower is sweetly fragrant with a scent that is reminiscent of Korean spice viburnum. Flowers are backed by rich green leaves that are free from disease and turn bright shades of orange and red in autumn. Plants exhibit excellent cold hardiness for the genus and have continued to impress us in our display beds. 5-6' – **2 gal \$25 (summer); 5 gal \$45**

Abelia x grandiflora 'Compacta' – Compact Abelia - Z6

A refined abelia forming a small shrub of compact profile with glossy, dark green leaves that remain semi-evergreen in warm climates. Fragrant, lilac-pink, tubular flowers are present for an extended period from mid-summer to mid-fall. - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Aesculus parviflora – Bottlebrush Buckeye – Z4

An excellent, underutilized native shrub. Plants assume a multi-stemmed, suckering habit that is unique among the buckeyes. In late spring, long, terminal white flower panicles appear and are set off by the bold, palmately compound foliage. The overall effect can be spectacular. In fall, the dark green leaves transform to bright yellow. Grows best in rich, well-drained soils in partial shade. – **2 gal \$29; 3 gal \$39; 5 gal \$49 (summer); Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

'Rogers' – A selection of *Aesculus parviflora* var. *serotina* that offers amazingly long drooping flower panicles that range from 18-30" in length. Plants peak a full month after the straight species and a week or two later than is typical for variety *serotina*. Named and introduced by Dr. JC McDaniel of the University of Illinois. - **3 gal \$45; 5 gal \$59 (summer)**

var. serotina – A larger growing variety of bottlebrush buckeye reaching heights as much as 20' tall when mature. Flowers appear several weeks later than the species and are often born in panicles that can reach 30" in length. – **2 gal \$29**

Aralia elata – Devil's Walking Stick – Z4

A spectacular, multi-stemmed suckering shrub that exhibits magnificent 40" tropical looking, bi-pinnately compound leaves. In mid to late summer, billowy, white flowers appear in huge 12-18" diameter panicles. After a considerable flowering period abundant blue-black fruit ripen

and last well into fall. The coarse textured stems, that only the devil would hold, are covered with prickles. Several cultivars exist; however, all are difficult to propagate and rarely offered.

'Aureovariegata' – The bold foliage of this selection is edged with an irregular gold margin. A moderately fast growing form that matures 10-12' in height. – **2 gallon \$89; 5 gallon \$129; Other sizes individually priced**

'Silver Umbrella' – The leaflets of this selection are smaller than other forms and are edged with a fine white margin. Plants are vigorous and mature 10-12' in height. Our favorite form. – **2 gallon \$89; 5 gallon \$129; 7 gal \$199; Other sizes individually priced**

'Variegata' - Similar in stature and vigor to the cultivar 'Aureovariegata', however, the foliage is edged with an irregular white margin. - **2 gallon \$89; 5 gal \$129 (summer)**

Aronia arbutifolia – Red Chokeberry – Z4

An upright, spreading, multi-stemmed shrub native to the eastern and midwestern United States. Plants display white, flat-topped flowers in early spring followed by red fruit in late summer. Transplants easily and is tolerant of many soil conditions. 5-10'

'Brilliantissima' – A dramatic improvement over the species offering glossy, dark green leaves that transform to brilliant shades of scarlet and red in fall. Additionally, this form flowers and fruits more profusely than seedlings. The fruit is glossy, bright red. – **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

Betula michauxii – Newfoundland Dwarf Birch – Z3

A dwarf, spreading shrub native to the sphagnum bogs and wet peaty meadows of Newfoundland and adjacent regions of Canada. Cute, ½" dark green, fan-shaped leaves cover the rambling branches throughout the growing season. Suitable for use at the edge of a wetland or can be adapted for use at the front of a border. 3' x 6' – **2 gal \$29; 3 gal \$39 (summer)**

Buddleia davidii – Butterfly Bush – Z6

An impressive, long blooming shrub worth growing for its fragrant, colorful flower display that is adorned by hummingbirds and butterflies. Plants are vigorous and flower on new growth. In cooler climates they should be cut back heavily in early spring to promote better flower production. We have the following selections available.

'Adokeep' Adonis Blue™ PPAF – A recent introduction with a compact habit and moderate sized, deep blue flowers. Silver dusted foliage and a pleasant floral fragrance provide added value. - **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

'Evil Ways' – An eye-catching butterfly bush discovered and introduced by Sean Hogan of Cistus Nursery. Plants strut flaming, bright yellow foliage that maintains its intensity throughout the growing season. Dark purple butterfly magnets begin to appear in mid to late summer and are produced deep into autumn. - **3 gal \$35**

'Thia' Santana™ PP 12383 - An attractive new variegated butterfly bush flaunting narrow leaves uniformly edged in bright gold. This dramatic display is topped off with a wealth of red-purple panicles in late summer. - **3 gal \$35**

'Windy Hill' - A wonderful form selected for its improved stem hardiness. Has been grown successfully in sheltered locations in both Zone 4 and 5 gardens. Fragrant, dark purple flowers. - **3 gal \$35**

NEW ***Callicarpa bodinieri 'Profusion'*** – Profusion Bodinier Beautyberry – Z6 – A vigorous, upright-arching shrub growing to a height of 6-8' with a similar spread. The deep green, oval leaves emerge flushed with attractive bronze-purple tones and pick up two toned golden-yellow autumn hues. In late August plants develop a stunning display of purple berries that are attractive past leaf drop and into December. Plants are pest and disease free giving excellent results in rich soils in both sun and part shade locales. - **3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Callicarpa dichotoma – Purple Beautyberry – Z5
A graceful, arching, small shrub native to China and Japan. The primary ornamental feature is the spectacular display of lilac-violet fruit in fall. Few plants can compete with the beautyberries at this time of the year. 3-4'

'Duet' - A dazzling selection from the U.S. National Arboretum that was discovered as a chance sport on a specimen of *C. dichotoma* var. *albifructus*. Plants are truly beautiful flaunting bold, white-edged foliage all season long. In fall, this display is complemented by a respectable display of unique, white berries. - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer); 5 gal \$45**

'Early Amethyst' - A wonderful form that produces copious crops of dazzling, violet berries on a gracefully arching 3-4' shrub. - **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (fall)**

'Spring Gold' – A unique selection of beautyberry recently discovered in Japan. The vigorous plants showcase new growth that is heavily mottled and brushed with gold and yellow. As the season warms the coloration transitions to the standard green of the genus. Autumn brings the classic display of metallic purple fruit we've come to expect from this fine group of plants. - **3 gal \$35**

'Variegata' - An eye-catching shrub with dramatic, white-splashed and streaked foliage. Looks amazing in fall when the foliage contrasts dramatically with the metallic-purple berries. Quite rare and choice! - **3 gal \$35**

Callicarpa japonica – Japanese Beautyberry – Z6

A medium-sized deciduous shrub native to Japan. Plants develop clusters of pink, sweetly fragrant flowers in July that are often obscured by the 2-3" leaves. The flowers often elicit a "what's that smell" reaction from customers who sense the fragrance but can't see the blooms amongst the plants greenery. In fall, the plants shine when they develop a dazzling showcase of long lived, purple berries. The beauty is difficult to describe but is certainly among the finest of all autumn displays. Plants are slightly larger growers than *C. dichotoma* types and have a slightly coarser texture. 5-6'

'Heavy Berry' – An outstanding selection that produces magnificent crops of metallic-purple berries each fall. Unmatched in our garden at this time of year. - **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

Calycanthus chinensis – Chinese Wax Shrub – Z6

An alluring Chinese species closely allied to the US native, *C. floridus*. The species was formerly classified in the genus *Sinocalycanthus* but was recently re-named. This vigorous shrub grows 6-10' tall with bold, medium green leaves that turn bright yellow in fall. In June, delicate, rounded buds unfold to display sumptuous, 3", pink-blushed white flowers accentuated by a ring of yellow stamens. Plants are easily grown in average garden soil in dappled shade. Blends nicely into the shrub border or woodland garden. - **2 gal \$29; 5 gal \$49**

Calycanthus floridus – Sweetshrub – Z5
An interesting and underutilized shrub native to the southeastern United States. Plants develop 2", fragrant, maroon flowers in May and sporadically in summer. Exceptional variability is present in seedling populations. - **5 gal \$45**

‘Athens’ – An attractive form offering medium green foliage and unique, greenish-yellow flowers that emit a fruity fragrance. Distinct among sweetshrub cultivars. 5-8’ – **2 gal \$29 (summer); 3 gal \$39; 5 gal \$59 (summer)**

‘Michael Lindsey’ - A must have sweetshrub! Dark, lustrous, green foliage turns soft, butter-yellow in fall. Countless, dark maroon flowers engulf the plants with an intoxicating strawberry-melon fragrance that can be enjoyed from up to 50 feet away on humid days. Plants are difficult to propagate and as a result are rarely offered. 6-8’ - **2 gal \$35**

***Calycanthus* hybrids** – Hybrid Sweetshrub – Z5
An exciting group of hybrids bred at and introduced by the talented scientists of North Carolina State University. All are the result of crosses between *Calycanthus chinensis*, *C. floridus* and the western U.S. native, *C. occidentalis*.

‘Hartlage Wine’ – A mouth watering hybrid between *Calycanthus chinensis* and *C. floridus* that combines many of the finest qualities of each parent. Large, wine-red flowers are produced for a month or more, in late spring and early summer. Plants are quite vigorous, growing 2-3’ a year in youth, reaching 8-12’ high and wide when mature. – **2 gal \$35; 3 gal \$49; 5 gal \$69 (fall); Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

‘Venus’ PP 15925 – A complex hybrid that produces large, magnolia-like, white flowers accentuated with yellow and purple markings in the center. Flowers have a delicate fragrance with an aroma reminiscent of strawberries and melons. Bloom time occurs primarily in spring with a spattering of additional flowers throughout the growing season. Sure to become a true garden treasure. Make sure to get yours early as supply won’t meet demand! – **2 gal \$35; 3 gal \$49; 5 gal \$69 (fall)**

Campylotropis macrocarpa – Campylotropis - Z5

A rarely seen shrub native to regions in Korea and China. The dense, 4-5’ specimens decorate themselves with 3” racemes of purple-pink, pea-like flowers in mid-late summer. Plants are easy to care for and are at their best in full sun, average garden settings. Makes an unusual addition to the sun drenched border or informal foundation planting. – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Caryopteris x clandonensis – Blue Mist Shrub – Z5

A low mounding shrub with soft blue flowers that appear in the late summer months. An excellent, deer resistant landscape plant for the dog days of summer. Plants benefit from some pruning or sheering in spring prior to leaf emergence.

‘Jason’ Sunshine Blue™ PPAF – A flamboyant selection made by England’s Peter Champion. Plants are strong growers with dramatic sunny yellow foliage and cheery dark blue flowers. Matures 3’ tall and wide. – **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45**

‘Summer Sorbet’ PP 15935 – A flashy sport of *Caryopteris* ‘Kew Blue’ offering attractive green leaves boldly margined in yellow. The striking foliage provides an ideal backdrop for the prolific blue flowers that begin to appear in August. Found by Peter van Delft of West End Nurseries, England. – **3 gal \$35**

Ceanothus americanus – New Jersey Tea – Z4
A tough, adaptable, small-stature shrub developing clusters of creamy-white flowers in summer. Plants assume a broad-mounded form with medium to rich green foliage. Plants are deserving of greater landscape consideration and are especially valuable for infertile, dry soils. - **2 gal \$25**

Cephalanthus occidentalis – Buttonbush – Z4
An underutilized native shrub with a mind boggling range that extends from New Brunswick to Florida and west to central California and Mexico. Plants assume a rounded, 5-6’ habit and are graced with unique, spherical clusters of creamy white flowers in mid-summer. The species is best suited to moist soils and is tolerant of sopping wet sites and seasonally standing water. – **2 gal \$25; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

‘Keystone’ – A superior form with increased plant vigor and added flower power. Plants are adaptable to dry conditions but are most valued for use in moist, waterlogged soils. - **3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Clethra acuminata – Cinnamon Clethra – Z5
An underutilized medium-sized shrub native to rocky, mountain sites in the southeastern United States. The 3-8”, drooping racemes of fragrant, white flowers appear in July and August creating a wonderful effect in the garden. Plants are also pleasing in winter with their striking, exfoliating, cinnamon-red bark. 8-12’ - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (summer); Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

Clethra alnifolia – Summersweet Clethra – Z4
An easy to grow native shrub that should find a home in everyone's garden. Provides a wonderful display of fragrant white flowers in July and August followed by butter-yellow fall color. Plants grow great in nearly any garden site including wet shade and salty soils along the shore. Even better they show good resistance to deer browse. In recent years the market has literally exploded with new forms and we are happy to offer some of the best.

'Anne Bidwell' – Impressive upright plants with huge, 8-10" branched inflorescences. Blooms up to two weeks later than other selections. 5-6' – **2 gal \$25**

'Caleb' Vanilla Spice™ PPAF – We love just about every form of summersweet that we trial in the gardens and this new selection seems quite promising. Reports suggest that the individual flowers of 'Vanilla Spice'™ are roughly double the size of typical *C. alnifolia* cultivars. This coupled with glossy, dark green leaves and spicy floral fragrance was more than enough to pique our interest. - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

'Ruby Spice' – A rich pink flowered form that was discovered and introduced by Broken Arrow Nursery. Flowers are the darkest pink to date and hold their color well in the heat of summer. Honored with many horticultural awards including the Cary Award and the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society Gold Medal. 5-6' – **2 gal \$25; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

'Sixteen Candles' – One of the most recent introductions to hit the market. Selected and introduced as an improved 'Hummingbird' by Dr. Michael Dirr. Has been reported to exhibit a superior habit and large spikes of white flowers. 30" - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer); 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

'Woodlander's Sarah' – An attractive new selection of summersweet clethra with leaves that are heavily speckled and splashed with cream and white. Plants are good performers showing more cream in the foliage than the other variegated selection, 'Creel's Calico'. - **2 gal \$29 (summer)**

Comptonia peregrina - Sweet Fern – Z2
An attractive, underutilized native species with rich green, pleasantly scented, fern-like foliage and a low growing, suckering nature. Plants are tough as nails preferring sandy, dry infertile sites over typical manicured garden soils. A great choice for that spot where everything else dies!

Forms a colony 3' high and up to 8' wide. – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Cornus alba – Tartarian Dogwood – Z3
A versatile, multi-stemmed shrub dogwood that blends easily into many landscape settings. Plants are tough as nails and make great companion plants in many growing conditions. 6-8'

'Aurea' – A choice treasure that displays dazzling yellow foliage in spring and brilliant red stems in winter. An excellent contrast element in the garden, especially when sited in sun. - **Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

'Bailhalo' Ivory Halo® PP 8722 – An improved form of 'Elegantissima' selected by Bailey Nursery. Plants are more compact, exhibit darker red winter stems and have better leaf spot resistance. 4-6' – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45**

'Cream Cracker' PP 12830 – Green foliage is edged with a bold creamy-yellow margin. Shows excellent leaf spot resistance. Purplish-red winter stem coloration. - **Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

'Elegantissima' – An old stand-by selection with green foliage broadly edged with a showy white margin. Bright red winter stem coloration. – **2 gal \$25; 5 gal \$45**

'Gouchaltii' - A rare form of shrub dogwood that has been floating around European gardens forever. Fortunately, it's finely starting to make its way into the US. Plants offer yellow variegated foliage with rose, pink and white highlights in the mix. Specimens are vigorous growers forming a sizeable 7' x 7' form in time. Classic dark red stems provide added season interest in winter. – **3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Cornus racemosa – Gray Dogwood – Z4
Imagine that, yet another wonderful, underutilized native shrub. Gray dogwood is a tough as nails plant commonly found in edge communities throughout our region. Plants assume a strong, multistemmed, suckering habit of upright, distinctly gray stems reaching 8-12' tall when mature. Deep green foliage cloaks the branches and transitions to purple and burgundy tones in autumn. Creamy-white flower clusters are born in early June literally engulfing the plants, lending a cloud-like appearance from a distance. Flowers transition to handsome, white, single seeded fruits which are quickly stripped by numerous bird species. After the fruits

disappear, bright, reddish-pink fruit stalks persist, leaving the plants in a magical haze deep into autumn. An excellent plant for naturalizing, borders, massing and attracting wildlife to the garden. – **2 gal \$25; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

Cornus sanguinea – Bloodtwig Dogwood – Z3
A bulky, 8-12' shrub dogwood with abundant, white, flat-topped flowers in May and early June followed by crops of purplish-black fruit in fall. Plants are good performers and are adaptable to all but the poorest soil conditions. The species is rarely cultivated however several excellent cultivars are available.

'Cato' Arctic Sun™ PP 18523 – A showy shrub dogwood that enlightens the winter landscape with its startling display of glistening yellow stems tipped with scarlet and orange. As an added bonus, plants are reported to mature half the size of 'Midwinter Flame'! 3-4' - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (fall)**

Cornus sericea – Red Osier Dogwood – Z2
A short, wide spreading shrub dogwood closely allied with *Cornus alba* and *C. amomum*. Plants develop a suckering, multi-stemmed habit and are valued for winter interest when their colorful twigs are at their best. Flat-topped, creamy-white flower clusters appear in spring adding seasonal interest. Plants are top performers tolerating both dry and wet sites in an assortment of light levels with ease. Makes an excellent filler plant and is also a suitable choice for mass planting.

'Bailey' – An older cultivar that is similar in look to the species with attractive dark green leaves that transition to rich, red-purple in fall. Prominent red winter twigs are equally eye-catching in late fall and winter. - **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45**

'Hedgerows Gold' – An excellent selection with dark green foliage punctuated with a dramatic bright gold margin. Prominent red twigs provide a superb winter display. Best foliage coloration occurs in full sun with a fair amount of air circulation. – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

'Silver and Gold' – A short, wide-spreading form that originated as a branch sport on the selection 'Flaviramea'. Offers fantastic, white-edged leaves throughout the growing season and cheery yellow twigs in winter. Plants are especially attractive when backed by evergreens. - **2 gal \$25; 5 gal \$45**

Corylopsis pauciflora – Buttercup Winterhazel - Z6

A highly regarded dense, spreading shrub that is most valued for its copious fragrant, yellow flowers that dangle from the branches in early spring prior to leaf emergence. Plants perform best in part shade in soil that is evenly moist throughout the growing season. - **2 gal \$29; 3 gal \$39 (summer)**

Corylopsis spicata – Spike Winterhazel – Z5
A breathtaking species of winterhazel native to wooded regions in Japan. In the garden, plants form moderate sized shrubs some 5' tall and 8' wide at maturity. Clear-yellow, fragrant flower racemes drip from the zigzag branches in spring prior to leaf emergence. Soon after flowering, purple tinged foliage emerges and ages to deep blue-green. Overall an excellent multipurpose shrub for use in many areas. – **2 gal \$29; 5 gal \$59; 7 gal \$89** **'Gold Spring'** – A welcome addition to the range of winterhazels available for garden use. 'Gold Spring' showcases bronze-brushed new growth that quickly transforms to startling shades of yellow and gold. This amazing display remains attractive throughout the growing season and adds a whole new appeal to this fantastic group of plants. - **2 gal \$35; 3 gal \$45; 5 gal \$69 (summer)**

Cotinus coggygria – Common Smokebush – Z4
A large rounded shrub grown primarily for its impressive "smoke-like" floral effect and brilliant crimson, yellow and purple autumn color. Plants are tough as nails preferring full sun and adapting well to all but wet growing conditions. 10-15'

'Ancot' Golden Spirit™ PP 13082 – An exciting new introduction with gorgeous, golden-yellow leaves, turning scarlet, orange and red in autumn. Typical "smoke-like" floral effect in July and August. Best foliage coloration occurs in full sun. – **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45**

'Grace' – A rapid growing hybrid between *Cotinus obovatus* and *C. coggygria*. This eye-catching selection offers deep, burgundy-purple new growth and brilliant, scarlet-red fall color. Makes a dramatic cut-back shrub. – **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

'Royal Purple' – A top performer offering vibrant burgundy-purple foliage followed by exquisite crimson-red fall color. Makes a breathtaking statement when combined with chartreuse or gold in the garden. - **2 gal \$25; 5 gal \$45 (summer)**

'Young Lady' – Another new smokebush recently developed in the Netherlands. This green leaved selection is unusual as it blooms prolifically from a young age. Nearly all shoots develop flowers from early summer to frost. Sure to be a big hit in the trade! – **3 gal \$35; 5 gal \$45**

***Daphne x burkwoodii* 'Carol Mackie'** - Burkwood Daphne - Z4

A quality selection of the burkwood daphne with fine, cream-white edged leaf margins. Develops delicate, soft-pink flowers in spring that emit an amazing fragrance. Wonderful when sited near an outside dining spot or favorite sitting area in the garden. Requires well-drained soils in full sun. 3-4' – **Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

***Daphne x transatlantica* 'Summer Ice'** –

Caucasian Daphne – Z5 - A handsome medium-sized shrub with white-edged, blue-green foliage that remains effective into January in our climate. The small, intoxicatingly fragrant, white flower clusters are present in abundance in May and June and occur sporadically throughout the remainder of the growing season. Plants require well-drained soils in full sun or high canopy shade. 4-5'

NEW ***Decaisnea fargesii*** – Dead Man's Fingers – Z6

And you wonder why this plant is uncommon? Don't we all want to own a plant called dead man's fingers? Common name aside, this is a great plant! The medium sized shrubs showcase tropical looking, pinnately compound leaves and unusual yellow-green flowers. In autumn, wild looking, metallic-blue fingers.....or fruit dangle from the stems. Best growth occurs in rich soils in a partially shaded setting. - **2 gal \$25 (summer)**

Deutzia gracilis – Slender Deutzia – Z4

A durable, broad mounding, deciduous shrub with graceful, arching branches. Plants are covered with countless pure white flowers in spring. A wonderful plant when in full bloom and a versatile addition to the garden. 3-4' – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

'Duncan' Chardonnay Pearls™ PP16098 – An appealing new deutzia offering season long, bright yellow foliage and a

delightful showing of white flowers in spring. Plants stick out like a beacon from a distance and add a whole new dimension to this wonderful group of plants. – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

'Nikko' – A more compact and refined selection with improved burgundy-red fall color. 2-3' – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

'Variegata' – Foliage is splashed and streaked with cream-yellow variegation. Excellent for foliage effect and garden accent. 3-4' – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Deutzia setchuensis* var. *corymbiflora – Deutzia – Z6

A terrific plant providing an arresting display of white, star-like flowers held along the elegant, arching branches. Flowers are the perfect complement to the small, grayish-green leaves that turn burgundy-red in fall. Plants reach 4-6' in height and blend well into the border. – **3 gal \$35**

Diervilla sessilifolia – Southern Bush Honeysuckle – Z4

A diminutive native of southeastern North America boasting delicate, trumpet-shaped yellow flowers held in groups at the end of the arching stems. The display begins in mid summer and continues into early autumn. Plants are tough as nails, shrugging off infertile soils and exposed locations with little effort. In the landscape they are most valued for erosion control or for consideration in the spots where everything else dies. 4-5'

NEW 'Pee Wee' – A compact pee gee hydrangea promising all the qualities of the species in a smaller package. Excellent for use in smaller gardens or areas where the dimensions of the species are overwhelming. 6' - **5 gal \$49**

'Phantom' – A new cultivar for us that we acquired recently. Plants are reported to have the largest flower heads of all the *Hydrangea paniculata* cultivars. Prunus maritima – Beach Plum – Z3

A noteworthy, suckering, deciduous shrub native to rocky, well-drained coastal regions from New Brunswick to Virginia. The ½" to 1" white flowers appear in May and are followed by clusters of 1" dull purple, plums. Fruit ripen in August and are frequently used in jams and jellies. Plants are easily transplanted and are valued for their adaptability to dry sites and areas with high salt levels. – **2 gal \$25; 5 gal \$45 (summer); Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

Ptelea trifoliata – Hoptree or Wafer Ash – Z3

Rhododendron atlanticum – Coastal Azalea – Z6

Plants form lightly branched stoloniferous colonies that average 4-5' in height and can extend for several acres under ideal conditions. That said, spread is often much more restricted under cultivation with plants generally developing into clumps only slightly broader than tall. Each blossom emits a sweet, heavy perfume that draws in any nose that passes by. Rhododendron calendulaceum – Flame Azalea – Z5

A remarkable deciduous azalea with a sprawling native range that extends throughout the Appalachian Mountain region of eastern North America. Plants develop an irregular, loose mounding form extending 4-8' tall and 8-10' wide. Glowing, 2" tubular flowers appear in late May and range in color from yellow to oranges

and reds. Native stands throughout the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina are particularly attractive at this time as entire hillsides literally burst forth in an unparalleled mosaic of color. Early explorers are said to have been alarmed by this display who, upon viewing the vast stands in bloom, thought the forests were on fire! Rhododendron viscosum – Swamp Azalea – Z3
Another deciduous azalea native to the eastern United States. Showcases a wonderful display of tubular, clove-scented white flowers in June. Excellent lustrous green foliage. Habit is highly variable and is often open with numerous spreading branches. Plants show tolerance to moist soils. - **24-30” \$79; 30-36” B+B \$99; 3-4’ B+B \$129**

Deciduous Azalea Hybrids –

‘**George Reynolds**’ – Z5 – A Knap Hill deciduous azalea with large bright yellow flowers marked with a prominent orange blotch. Leaves emerge with bronzy overtones and take on rich purple tints in autumn. Plants mature wider than tall reaching 5’ x 7’. - **2 gal \$35; 3 gal \$45 (summer)**

A durable plant that shows exceptional drought tolerance and adaptability to a range of growing conditions including dry sites and infertile areas. 2-6' high and wide.

'Gro-low' – A low, wide-spreader that acts more like a groundcover than a shrub. Excellent, glossy green foliage and brilliant, orange-red fall color. – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35**

Rhus coppalina – Flameleaf Sumac – Z4
A large deciduous shrub or small tree that is encountered on disturbed sites throughout eastern North America. Plants have a suckering nature forming colonies of crooked and sculpted branches some 15-20' tall. Stems are cloaked with lustrous dark green leaves that take on rich scarlet and crimson tones as autumn arrives. Upright, 4-8" clusters of greenish-yellow flowers play off the foliage during the late summer months. Plants are best utilized in large

landscapes where they perform admirably in infertile, rocky, drought prone soils. Great for massing, bank stabilization or naturalistic plantings.

'Lanham's Purple' – An impressive clone that we finally acquired after numerous years of searching. Foliage emerges rich burgundy-purple in spring holding its color throughout the season. Like the species, brilliant scarlet-red tones dominate in fall. Discovered by the late, great plantsman Gary Lanham of Lebanon, KY. - **7 gal \$89**

Rhus typhina – Staghorn Sumac – Z4
Another tough, native, suckering shrub frequently encountered along roadsides and other edge habitats in eastern North America. Exhibits bright green foliage which transforms to scarlet, orange and yellow in fall. Female plants bare a wonderful display of unique hairy fruit in early fall. The fruit display often remains effective well into the winter months. Plants sucker freely from underground stems making them ideal candidates for massing or naturalizing. Additionally, they are quick to establish and will tolerate any well-drained soil in full sun. 15-20' tall with an equal or greater spread.

'Bailtiger' Tiger Eyes™ PP 16185 -
An exciting new selection from Bailey Nursery with vivid chartreuse-yellow foliage that contrasts brilliantly with the coarse-textured, fuzzy stems. The leaf color holds up well throughout the growing season turning intense orange, yellow and scarlet in autumn. Plants are smaller and more manageable than the species reaching only 6' in height at maturity. - **5 gal \$49; 7 gal \$69**

Rosa glauca – Redleaf Rose – Z3
Hands down our favorite rose for foliage effect with its outstanding smoky-purple leaves. Delicate, soft pink single flowers and dark maroon hips complement the foliage throughout the season. Dark purple stems add interest during the winter months. 6' – **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

NEW ***Rubus odoratus*** - Thimbleberry – Z3
An undemanding ornamental raspberry native throughout eastern North America. The deciduous, shrubs grow 5-6' tall and form colonies by suckering and tip layering. In summer, the arching stems flaunt 2", single, rich pink to rose-purple flowers which appear in succession into early autumn. Bold, 10" maple-like leaves provide useful garden texture. Unlike many raspberries the stems of thimbleberry are hairy, lacking the sharp prickles associated with

its cousins. Late in the season conservative crops of edible red berries are produced providing forage for wildlife. Excellent for use in shade gardens or for naturalizing. - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Salix alba – White Willow – Z2

A highly variable willow species offering exceptional cold hardiness. Although rarely planted, the true species develops into a massive specimen. An excellent choice for moist locations where few other plants will grow.

‘Sericea’ – A handsome selection with soft, silvery felted foliage making it outstanding for contrast and texture in the garden. Plants are rapid growers and will quickly form a small 20’ tree. If this size is not desired it can be kept smaller through annual pruning. – **3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Salix babylonica ‘Crispa’ – Ram’s Horn Willow – Z6

‘Pendula’ – A fine weeping form that can be staked to produce an elegant weeping tree or left untrained to develop into a unique trailing mound or groundcover. – **Assorted B+B plants individually priced**

‘Variegata’ – The foliage of this clone is splashed and streaked with white and pink variegation. Plants are a striking improvement over the typical green foliage forms. – **5 gal \$45**

NEW ***Salix chaenomeloides*** – Giant Pussy Willow – Z4

A choice willow species widely promoted as having steel-silver catkins that approach the size of a rabbit’s foot. Realistically that’s probably an over exaggeration but the take home message is that the catkins are massive. Plants are vigorous growers and the late winter catkin display is among the best of the group. Excellent for use at the back of the border or for cut branches. – **3 gal \$35 (summer)**

Salix elaeagnos – Rosemary Willow – Z4

Among the finest of all willows for foliage color and textural contrast. The vigorous plants flaunt silky, pewter-gray, ribbon-like leaves along wispy, bronze-blushed stems. Performs admirably in both wet and dry soils in full sun and shows excellent resistance to the willow leaf beetle. Plants are most commonly used as a contrast element or backdrop for other shrubs and perennials but would also be suitable for use as an informal hedge. 10’ - **2 gal \$25 (summer)**

Salix exigua – Coyote Willow – Z5

A large shrub or small tree with attractive, silvery-grey foliage that remains attractive throughout the growing season. Makes an excellent contrast element in the garden. Salix integra – Japanese Willow – Z4

Overall, a unique piece of living architecture sure to insight a comment or two from garden visitors. Salix purpurea – Blue Arctic Willow – Z3

An attractive willow offering attractive, finely textured blue-green foliage born on stems which take on a smoky purple coloration in the winter months. Blends nicely into the shrub border or back of the perennial garden. As an added bonus the slender stems have long been used for basket making.

‘Nana’ – A rounded, compact clone of the blue arctic willow, maturing 4-5’ high and wide. – **5 gal \$45**

‘Pendula’ – A weeping selection that forms an arching shrub or can be trained into a small weeping tree. – **7 gal \$49**

Salix x simulatrix – Dwarf Creeping Willow – Z4

A natural hybrid that can be found in the highlands of Scotland, Scandinavia and northern Russia. Develops into a dwarf rambling shrub with shimmering, dark green leaves along thick, reddish brown stems. Sambucus nigra – Elderberry – Z5

A fast growing, versatile shrub that has been valued throughout the ages for a tremendous number of uses including dye making, insect repellent, ointments, wines, jellies and musical instruments among other things. Recent breeding work has added a host of foliage and color patterns to the mix. We think everyone should add one to their gardens and besides, if you ever need to get rid of those pesky bugs or soften your skin you know which bush to call on.

‘Eva’ Black Lace™ PP 15575 – An exciting form showcasing sexy, midnight-purple, deeply divided foliage. The lacy leaves are complemented by 6” clusters of pale pink flowers in summer and crops of edible berries in autumn. Plants have caused quite a stir and have been promoted as a substitute for Japanese maples in the north. - **2 gal \$25; 3 gal \$35**

‘Sutherland Gold’ – Actually a selection of *Sambucus racemosa* but listed here for ease of writing. ‘Sutherland Gold’ is a beautiful cultivar with lacy, deeply cut, golden yellow foliage that holds its color throughout the growing season. Sophora davidii – Father David’s Sophora – Z5

'Alpina' – A charming selection that develops into a lush, spreading form 2' tall and several feet wide. 'Katherine Havemeyer' – A classic mainstay in the world of lilacs. 'Katherine Havemeyer' is quite a lady with prominent, fully double, lavender-pink florets that emerge from slightly darker buds. 'Krasavitska Moskvyy' – Masses of fully double white flowers with pink-blushed buds and petals. An excellent Russian hybrid and one of our favorites! – **3-4' B+B \$89; 4-5' B+B \$109**

Viburnum dilatatum – Linden Viburnum – Z5
A large rounded shrub developing masses of 3-5" flat-topped flower clusters in May and June. Flowers are followed by showy red fruit that remain effective late into the year. Makes a wonderful specimen shrub or addition to the shrub border. Matures 8-10' high and wide.

Viburnum lentana – Wayfaringtree Viburnum – Z4

A large multi-stemmed shrub with somewhat coarse branch structure. The large ovate leaves are dark green, velvety and of heavy texture. In late May plants are clothed with numerous 3-5” creamy-white odorless flower clusters. As the season progresses the flowers become 1/3” red-black fruit. Plants are versatile and can be used for hedges, screens, or in mass.

Viburnum nudum – Smooth Witherod Viburnum – Z5

Flowers are creamy-white and appear in June and July in large flat-topped clusters. In fall the fruit transitions from green to pink to blue to black as they ripen. Truly a

Viburnum opulus – European Cranberry Viburnum – Z3

This display is followed by crops of bright red fruit that ripen in autumn and persist through early winter. One of the easiest viburnums to grow and an excellent choice for residential landscapes.
